Participation in the Sunfeast Marathon





TRACK

Sensory Integration Track

For children 2-18 years

Sensory Integration refers to the process by which the brain organises and interprets touch, movement, body-awareness, sight, sound, and gravity - in a holistic manner. For children who have issues in integrating stimuli they receive through their senses to respond appropriately, the SI track in Coles Park and Gayatri Devi park, offers a variety of stimuli for children to develop their sensory awareness. Sand, grass, concrete, tiles and other textures are used to stimulate both the hands and legs, enabling children to respond more appropriately.

Gayathri Devi park at Rajaji Nagar

FEBRUARY 21, 2009: More than 10 children with their parents joined us for our first event at the Gayathri Devi park at Rajaji Nagar. These children came in from a slum community where APD works. The children, all tiny ones in the age group of 2-5 yrs, were initially hesitant interacting with the KILIKILI team. As they settled down in their swings enjoying their rides, they started responding positively with the volunteers. The family swing, rope climbing and the merry go round were a huge hit. The play was followed by a food fest where the tired children and the guardians enjoyed yummy cakes and other goodies, sharing their experiences of the day. Their bus arrived at around 1pm where everyone left with a promise to be back again every Saturday to have more fun and with more children.

Divya and Anjana who were the two key volunteers for the events had this to say about the event:

"When I realized there is more in life than just doing nothing, I decided to do something that brings a smile to those wonderful kids who are truly special. Kilikili gave me an opportunity to serve these special kids and my experience has been astounding. I got a chance to interact with children with various disabilities during this event. They say "A smile says a million words and a tear says a thousand words. One look says it all." I will continue to spread this happiness undoubtedly through Kilikili. "- Anjana.
